
Recruiting Traditional Students

Traditional students, those who come to Lane within one year of high school graduation, accounted for one third of Lane's new, non-international students in 2022/23. Although outnumbered by non-traditional recruits, traditional students exerted an outsized positive impact on enrollments.

- **76% were retained Fall to Winter** compared to **60%** for non-traditional students.
- **57% persisted Fall to Fall,** compared to **45%** for non-traditional students.
- Despite being 33% of the new student population, traditional students completed 43% of all credits completed by new students during the year.

Although enrollment is currently up, demographics and declining college going rates are affecting Lane. The portion of Oregon high school graduates going to college within one year fell from 68% in 2015 to 61% in 2021.¹ There will be about 6,000 fewer kids in kindergarten compared to 12th grade across Oregon in the next several years.² In this environment, Lane must strive to recruit traditional as well as non-traditional students.

Lane cultivates traditional students by enrolling high schoolers in <u>College Now</u> courses. Besides sustaining high-touch recruitment activities such as college fairs and campus tours, Lane reaches traditional students where they live, on social media. Messages to youth are relateable and relevant, emphasizing Lane's flexibility and portability. Messages to parents feature opportunities like <u>Oregon</u> <u>Promise</u> and Lane being a smart first step into higher education.

Transition to Lane is supported by **Career Technical summer camps**, by the free online or in-person college/career orientation course **<u>RTEC 101</u>**, and by engaging students throughout the recruitment, admissions, and registration process using **TargetX software**.

Local public high schools sent 606 traditional students to Lane in 2022/23. Lane's combined *yield rate* among schools that contributed at least one student was 22%. More than 1 in 5 local public high school graduates enrolled at Lane within one year.
